Selected Vocabulary from Matthew 5 and Luke 6

Greek-English Lexicon of the New Testament and Other Early Christian Literature

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Blessed μακάριος *makarios*. “**2** pertaining to being especially favored, *blessed, fortunate, happy, privileged*, from a transcendent perspective, the more usual sense (the general Gr-Rom. perspective: one on whom fortune smiles)... **a** of humans privileged recipient of divine favor...”

Full ἐμπίλημι *empiplēmi*. “**2** to provide a sufficient amount, satisfy ... satisfy oneself...
3 ‘have one’s fill of something’, in the sense enjoy something.”

Meek πραῦς *praus*. “Pertaining to not being overly impressed by a sense of one’s self-importance, *gentle, humble, considerate, meek* in the older favorable sense ... unassuming.”

Merciful ἐλεήμων *eleēmōn*. “pertaining to being concerned about people in their need, *merciful, sympathetic, compassionate*.”

Mourn πενθέω *pentheō*. “**1** intransitive, to experience sadness as the result of some condition or circumstance, *be sad, grieve, mourn* ... in contrast to joy.”

Peacemaker εἰρηνοποιός *eirēnopoios*. “pertaining to endeavor to reconcile persons who have disagreements, *making peace*.”

Poor πτωχός *ptōchos*. “**1** pertaining to being economically disadvantaged, originally ‘begging’...
2 pertaining to being thrust on divine resources... The thought is also that since they are oppressed and disillusioned they are in special need of God’s help, and may be expected to receive it shortly...
3 lacking in spiritual worth, figurative extension of **1**.”

Pure καθαρός *katharos*. “**2** pertaining to being cultically/ceremonially pure, *ritually pure*...
3 pertaining to being free from moral guilt, *pure, free from sin*.”

Rejoice χαίρω *hairō*. “**1** to be in a state of happiness and well-being, *rejoice, be glad*.”

Rich πλούσιος *plousios*. “**1** pertaining to having an abundance of earthly possessions that exceeds normal experience, *rich, wealthy*... A rich man (i.e. one who does not need to work for a living).”

Woe οὐαί *ouai*. “**2** a state of intense hardship or distress, *woe*.”
