- A few believers come together any time, any place^b.
- Agree that this is a cell for the next few minutes.
- Invite Jesus to come into your midst.
- Read something from the New Testament^j.

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3. What does a cell do together?

- Help those who have urgent needs⁹.
- Help each other obey Jesus' commandments^h.
- Enjoy the Lord's Supper togetherⁱ.
- Help visitors understand who Jesus is and what he can do for people^f.

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- Talk about it and listen to each other.
- Listen to each other's needs and ask Jesus for help.
- Put Jesus in charge of the place and the officials where your cell meets^k.
- Eat something to remember Jesus body and drink something to remember his bloodⁱ.

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7. What if officials tell us to stop?

- Speak respectfully and understand their concern^m.
- Explain that you are friends, not "the church".
- Meet on your own free time.
- You may have to meet more quietly.
- Do not stop doing cell^h.

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5. What if others ask what we are doing?

- Yes, you and your friends talk about Jesus and his teachings¹.
- No, you are not holding a "church service".

(For many, "church" means a legally-registered, religious organization. Your cell is not that.) A student cell group

1. What is a cell?

- Jesus called his people "church"^a.
- Churches can happen as a big body and as little cells.
- Both sizes are real church, if Jesus is there^b.
- A cell can happen anywhere as a part of a bigger body.
- Those who believe in Jesus can do a cell anywhere, any time with anybody.
